
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## Jason Das - The Secret Life of Squirrels



## Yasaman Mehrsa - Oneness With Nature



# Enrique Bravo - Rowing together, growing together



Faces representing the contrasts of multiculturalism share the composition in a collage with the exuberant natural colourful beauty of Pickering.






## Carolyn Boyd - Beauty at the Waterfront

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
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## Talie Shalmon - Fish of Lake Ontario






# Sumaira Munir - Nurturing Nature and Culture in Pickering
